

PROPOSAL

The Tufts University International Programs and Partnerships department is extremely pleased to offer the following proposal for an International Programs Institute for approximately 15 students from Keio University that will take place February 24 – March 6, 2020 at Tufts University. A brief proposal that provides an outline of Tufts University, the International Programs and Partnerships department, as well as details of the proposed structure and services is below for your review.

Background of Tufts University

Established in 1852, Tufts University is a private university and a leader in American higher education, distinctive for its success as a moderately sized university that excels at research and is committed to providing students with a personal experience. With campuses in Boston, Medford/Somerville & Grafton, Mass., and Talloires, France, Tufts University currently has a total student population of 11,449 students; 5,960 undergraduate students and 5,489 graduate and professional students. Approximately 15% of the Tufts populations are international students or scholars. There were 107 countries represented and the 10 countries with the largest number of international students, faculty, and scholars at Tufts are, in descending order:

Background of International Programs and Partnerships

The International Programs and Partnerships department is charged with expanding traditional English as a foreign language (EFL) programs, creating new non-degree international programs and partnerships, responding to opportunities from institutions such as the Institute for International Education (IIE), as well as partnering with other departments throughout the university to expand and enhance the many international initiatives that Tufts University currently offers.

The core programming of this department is offered through its English Language Programs division. Since 2009, this programming has steadily expanded from offering only short-term summer programs to offering year-round classes that prepare international pre-college students for enrollment in American universities, providing summer residential programming for the Confucius Institute, developing customized ESL programming for high schools, and implementing capacity building programming for universities and international government agencies.

Working through its International Programs division, the International Programs and Partnerships department offers the following services.

AIRPORT PICKUP AND PROGRAM ENROLLMENT DOCUMENTS

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

This is a two-week program designed for students from Keio University. The goals of the program are to: (1) provide an overview of U.S. foreign policy in East Asia and U.S. perspectives toward Japan; (2) promote discussion and debate in the English language; and (3) offer an experience of lectures and discussion in a leading university in the United States. Students will explore the following themes:

- U.S.- Japan and Partnership
- The Rise of China
- The Korean Peninsula
- \circ Globalization

Students will take part in a series of traditional lectures that will take place between 10:00 am -12:00 pm and 1:00 pm -3:00 pm each day. Each lecture will be approximately 1.5 hours long and there will be 30 minutes for questions and answers at the conclusion of the lecture. Students will receive a reading list and will also receive a list of questions and topics to serve to help them think about the topic and prepare them for the lectures they will attend. It is expected that students actively participate in the class each day.

From 3:15 pm - 5:00 pm each day except Friday, students will take part in a structured workshop with Tufts University program staff. Staff members will consist of undergraduate students with unique views on these issues. This is a chance for students to exchange their thoughts and ideas about these topics while also exchanging their ideas about broader topics regarding life in the U.S. Tufts University will also arrange for graduate students from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy to visit as well. There will be guided questions for each session but this is an opportunity for students to learn beyond the classroom. Students may also use time during these sessions as a study and homework period.

Each student will have to write a one-page response to four different lectures that take place throughout the program. One of the sessions must be from the final Thursday of the program. The response should be focused on an issue that has challenged your perspective. Each paper should be single spaced and in Times New Roman, 12-point font.

Each student will also be asked to write a five-page policy paper that will address an issue of their choosing. The policy paper will provide a recommendation on how to address the issue from their perspective. Each student must use information from the readings, outside

readings, and information during the lectures. A sample paper will be provided to help the students provide structure.

ACTIVITIES AND PROGRAM STAFF

- Group activities in the evenings and the weekends.

 - Visit to Harvard Square and Tour of Harvard.

 - Visit to famous Newbury Street.
 - ✓ Transportation to off-campus activities will be by school bus and/or public transportation (participants are to purchase their MBTA passes).
- Welcome Dinner.
- Graduation Lunch.

- Double hotel room accommodation at the Medford Hyatt or comparable hotel. When possible, students will be assigned a homestay.
- Access to the Tisch Library and Eaton Computer Labs.
